The meeting was called to order at 6:30 pm by Mark Brown.

The invocation was led by Linda Southard, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

CONSENT AGENDA:

Brown suggested moving the Closed Session, making it the last agenda item. Strickland asked for the removal of item 12D Discussion of Minimum Housing Code, as it is a large document and little time has been given to go over it. She further noted there were numerous points of contention in just the first few pages and she felt more time was needed to review it. Brandt suggested that council read the document, send comments and suggestions to him, and revisit it in August. Hill noted this was just a draft, which would be substantially revised.

Strickland asked several questions about the Financial Report, which were answered by Brandt and Luther.

Wray made a motion to approve the Consent Agenda, including the meeting agenda as amended, minutes of the May 28, June 10, and June 19, 2008 meetings, the June 10, and June 19, 2008 Closed Session minutes, and the Financial Report. The motion was seconded by Williams and carried unanimously.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Joint Meeting of the Town Council, Zoning Board, Comprehensive Plan Committee to kick-off new Comprehensive Plan development July 15, 7:00-9:00 pm Summerfield Elementary School

Brown announced the meeting, and also discussed the Family Services of the Piedmont 10 Year Plan to End Homelessness. He thanked Jane Doggett for volunteering to be the point of contact person to bring back information on this initiative.

BUSINESS FROM THE MAYOR

Certificate presentation to Greg Mauser, Eagle Scout Nominee and Park Volunteer

Brown asked Mauser to come forward, thanked him for his contribution of two benches and a nature trail in the park, and presented him with a Certificate of Appreciation.

SPEAKERS FROM THE FLOOR (limited to 5 min. on non-agenda items)

Dwayne Crawford, 1106 NC Hwy 150 West, presented petition documents with the signatures of 600 citizens who are opposed to construction of an amphitheater in the park. He asked council to cease actions, efforts, and expenditures towards the project, and recommends spending money on test wells instead, especially in light of the economy.

Shirley Jennings, 5800 Francis Marie Ct, has the same concerns as Crawford, the biggest being the potential for noise and music intruding on peace and quiet, and noted the 2005 survey indicated that the citizens wanted walking and biking trails and open space. She asked council to reconsider the amphitheater based on accountability to Summerfield residents and noted that it could be put off and revisited in the future.

Elizabeth McClellan, 7103 Lentz Ct, says her neighborhood borders the park and she is concerned about the impact the amphitheater will have on the rural character of Summerfield, that it does not fit in with the community, and money should be spent to meet actual needs first, such as walking trails.

Bea Curtis spoke of her concern with the loss of rural character in Summerfield, specifically increased traffic along Greenlawn Road.

Gail Dunham, 5808 Snow Hill Dr, stated the volunteer application language was already approved by council, and now some members are opposed to it. She feels the language is necessary to protect the citizens and the town from liability. Dunham further stated she is not opposed to the park, but per Dr. Sellar's survey, citizens want open space and walking trails, not an amphitheater.

Beth Kaplan, 7979 Highfill Rd, is a proponent of the amphitheater and hopes it will be utilized by the community. As to the volunteer application, she feels it had little to no public input and it is good judgment to revisit the issue.

Muriel Inabnet, 1101 W Northwood St Greensboro, representative of Servant's Garden discussed their Plant a Row for the Hungry project and asked the town to participate by finding land that could be used for planting vegetables.

In response to Inabnet's request, Flowers recommended the empty lot owned by the town be utilized by volunteers to plant and harvest food that would then be donated to charities.

Elizabeth Edmunds, 5105 White Blossom Dr, feels the amphitheater is creating dissention in the town and is not practical or economical at this time, as it would only be used on weekends, afternoons, and holidays, and in good weather, and Greensboro has already cornered the market on the type of events that would be appropriate for such a facility. Edmunds stated Summerfield cannot compete with Greensboro and the amphitheater may stand empty and unused up to 80% of the year.

Mike Stewart, 1328 NC Hwy 150, feels it is not about competing with Greensboro, rather the amphitheater is for the citizens of Summerfield, that it has been discussed since 2000 and as the contracts are already in place it is a dead issue now and everything was done above board. He speculated that the 600 petition signers may not have known what they were signing.

Dwayne Crawford stated the petition documents were available online.

- G. **Comprehensive Plan:** Harmon announced the joint meeting of the Comprehensive Plan Committee, Town Council, and Zoning Board on July 15, 2008 7:00 – 9:00 pm at the Summerfield Elementary School Multipurpose Room.

PUBLIC HEARING

Rezoning Case #01-08: RS-40, LO, SR and TCD-M to CU-LB and SR (Scenic Corridor District). Owned by The Vineyards at Summerfield, LLC. The property is located at 6999- (Near) Toscana Trace (approximately .4 miles north of the intersection of Hwy 220 N and Strawberry Rd), being a portion of Guilford County tax map # 01-35, block 852, parcel 109. The property, located in Bruce Township, includes approximately 4.332 acres.

Harmon presented the case, reading from the Staff Report. He noted the following conditions:

1. All uses allowed by LB except the following: Finance of Loan Office with Drive Through, Laundry or Dry Cleaning Plant, Construction or Demolition Landfill, Land Clearing & Inert Debris Landfill, Utility Substation.
2. Maximum of one driveway on Hwy 220 N.
3. Type "B" planting year shall be provided adjacent to Hwy 220 N.

The following conditions were offered by the applicant and accepted by the Zoning Board:

4. Added to "All uses allowed in LB except the following": Junked Motor Vehicle, Satellite Dish/Communication Tower, Laundry or Dry Cleaning Substation, Construction or Demolition Landfill, Minor, and Billboards.
5. Applicant will dedicate a 20 foot public trail easement along the existing railroad bed line and a 10 foot public trail easement along the northern border of the property from the railroad bed to Hwy 220. The 10 foot easement will be abandoned by the town if an alternate location should become available.

The property is currently vacant and the proposed use is commercial, and is compatible with the Long Range Plan and the Commercial Needs Assessment. Harmon discussed Staff Conclusions:

Positive: LB zone would allow for moderate commercial use; already zoned commercial; widening of 220
Negative: Increased traffic on US 220, proximity to walking trail. Harmon further stated the Zoning Board voted 5 to 0 to recommend approval of the rezoning.

Williams asked about a trail that was proposed in the past, leading to Food Lion shopping center. Brandt stated it was not feasible in the discussed location due to the creeks on the property, but there was another option of using 220 and going north. Strickland asked about the actual acreage to be rezoned, noting the acreage for that property address was listed as 22.21. Harmon replied 5 acres with a pond was deeded to the neighboring home owners association and verified that 4.33 acres was the only portion of the acreage to be rezoned.

There was discussion about possible allowable uses under the proposed zoning. Strickland noted coin-operated laundries were not specifically included, and following some discussion, it was found that while allowable under the proposed rezoning, that it was not allowable in this watershed critical area.

Brown opened the Public Hearing at 7:36 pm.

John Higgins, 101 W Friendly Ave, Suite 500 Greensboro, stated the owner is very limited on square footage and distance between buildings by the current zoning. He thanked staff for working with the owner and engineer, and noted the community seems positive toward the proposed changes. Higgins says the applicant has worked extensively with the neighboring HOA, has already deeded the pond to them as a measure of good faith, and stated the HOA president sent a letter of endorsement for the proposed rezoning.

As there were no other speakers, Brown closed the Public Hearing at 7:43 pm.

Strickland is agreeable to the conditions and noted the unanimous recommendation to approve by the Zoning Board

Strickland made a motion to approve Rezoning Case #01-08, RS-40, LO, SR and TCD-M to CU-LB and SR. The motion was seconded by Flowers and carried unanimously.

Break from 7:44 to 7:54 pm

Brown called the meeting back to order at 7:54 pm.

PRESENTATION: Republic Waste Services Update to Town Council and Residents; Jimmy Torrey, General Manager Greensboro Office

Mr. Torrey discussed the following items:

- The current contract expires 12/31/08, with an option to renew for one year periods
- They serve 2800 residents with weekly garbage collection and bi-weekly recycling collection which is 60% participation
- Results of an August 2006 survey indicated an *excellent* rating of 90% and a *good* rating of 10%, with no responses of *fair* or *poor*.
- Republic Waste has supported Founders' Day and other community events over the years by distributing items to children and providing event boxes and garbage removal
- He discussed services and comparison of rates between Summerfield and other communities

Due to increased costs including rising fuel costs, waste disposal fee increases, and Senate Bill 1492, Torrey announced consideration of an \$.18 increase per month, per household. Strickland asked about a fuel surcharge and Torrey responded that was not proposed at this time. Strickland asked about incentives and Torrey noted that there were incentives for longer term contract periods because he could then invest money in new equipment and capital investments. Flowers asked if the town was to sign a 5-year contract if there would be periodic rate increases. Torrey said increases are not projected, but it was not certain that there would not be increases. Strickland asked about the \$.37 of every \$2.00 that was slated to be distributed to local governments. Brandt stated it was unclear what the qualifications were, but at this time that money will be used to clean up existing landfills.

Brandt recommended looking at what other municipalities are doing before deciding whether or not to go out for bids. He stated it was not a reflection on Republic, rather it is the town's responsibility to investigate all options.

There was discussion of the good job Republic was doing and the improvement that has been made in the service over the years.

BUSINESS FROM TOWN MANAGER:

A. Old Business: Approve change to Purchasing Policy as proposed

Brandt read the proposed language change. Strickland noted it would be inconsistent for her to vote for this since she did not vote for the budget.

Barnes made a motion to approve the Purchasing Policy language change. The motion was seconded by Williams and passed 4 to 1, with Strickland opposed.

B. Discuss Results from Senior Survey

Brandt discussed both the process and the results. Brown suggested inviting Ellen Whitlock to next month's meeting to discuss what Senior Resources feels about the results and what ideas they have. He further noted the current activities at the churches were mainly used by *older* seniors, and that different activities aimed at *younger* seniors may be warranted.

Speaking from the floor, Don Wendelken noted that often seniors that have a need will not write it down or ask because they are prideful, but if something needed is offered they will gladly participate. Speaking from the floor, Elizabeth Ingram stated while she is a senior, she was not interested in sitting around playing bingo and would prefer cultural or social type events.

Following some discussion, Brandt asked council to indicate if there was willingness on some level to investigate other activities and programs and if so he would invite Whitlock and perhaps put together a focus group to look at possibilities. By consensus, Brandt was directed to move forward on looking into this issue.

C. Discuss Town Newsletter

Brandt stated there is a need for a better method of communication all around, between council, boards, staff, and citizens, and as a beginning, he requested approval to begin development of a summer newsletter. Information to be included includes the following: budget information, Parks & Rec events and construction progress, news from the Fire, Sheriff, Animal Control, and other community news, lists of committee and council meeting dates, and Comprehensive Plan updates. This is a budgeted item, and Brandt anticipates creating and mailing newsletters quarterly.

Flowers asked who had done the newsletters before and Brandt replied himself and other staff.

Wray made a motion directing the Manager to begin development of a Town newsletter. Williams feels a committee is necessary, as this has been approved for the last two years but has fallen through the cracks. Strickland feels the manager should be able to handle it without a committee. The motion was seconded by Barnes. Flowers hopes the newsletter will be more informational than anything else. Brown called for a vote and the motion carried unanimously.

D. Discussion of Minimum Housing Code Ordinance (continued to August 12, 2008 meeting)

E. Discussion of protected wildlife habitat program at Community Park

Brandt described the proposal, recommended by SPARC, to designate a portion of the park as a protected wildlife habitat area. The area, approximately 9 acres, is along the north-eastern park boundary from the outdoor events area to the main gravel trail leading to the Guilford County tower would be left in its natural state, protected from future development, except for the construction or delineation of nature trails

and signage. Potentially, invasive vegetation would be replaced with native vegetation to encourage wildlife habitation and the area could be expanded in the future.

Strickland asked about cost, noting the project funding request is for \$1500, but there will also potentially be maintenance costs. Brandt stated the maintenance depends on how far council wants to go with this project; currently, the only maintenance proposed would be minimal, signage placement and basic landscaping, such as removing fallen trees across the trail.

Brown feels it is a good way to preserve this property for a long time.

Wray made a motion to approve funding for the wildlife habitat program and to approval of concepts and ideas for development of future projects and programs. Strickland says there is no cost estimate on the future projects and she would not vote for something without knowing the cost. Speaking from the floor, Sherrie Joseph, Parks & Rec committee member, stated the committee only wished to present ideas to council at a future time to measure interest, and if there was an interest, they would then research costs and present the information to council.

Wray amended his motion to approve funding for the wildlife habitat program in the amount of \$1500. The motion was seconded by Williams and carried unanimously.

Wray made a motion to approve investigation of concepts and ideas for development of future projects and programs without obligating town funds. The motion was seconded by Williams. Following brief discussion, the motion carried unanimously.

BUSINESS FROM COUNCIL

A. Further discussion of volunteer application, ethics statement and background checks (Council)

Brandt presented the issue, discussing the history, rationale, and reasons it was brought up. He recommends conducting background checks on those committees/committee members that interact with children, and those who handle town funds. He noted the only person who actually has regular access to town funds is the Finance Committee chair, who has the authority to transfer town funds and sign checks. Those on the Community Relations committee potentially handle money during Founders' Day, but new controls and policies will probably reduce or eliminate that. He recommends replacing item 6 of the ethics statement on the committee application with a statement saying those who apply for the above listed types of committee positions may be subject to a background check. This was also recommended by Hill.

Strickland and Flowers feel the background checks should be done for *all* committee applicants, rather than picking and choosing among them.

Following lengthy discussion and debate, including issues of potential liability, conflicts, judgment calls, processes, practicalities, legal responsibilities, and other available options, Barnes made a motion to approve changing the language of item 6 to "By signing this application, you may be subject to a criminal background check." The motion was seconded by Williams, and carried 3 to 2, with Strickland and Flowers opposed.

B. Discussion of length of time volunteers may serve on committees (Wray)

Brandt suggested that due to the recent policy and ordinance adoptions that we wait on this item and see what happens based on policies and procedures that are now in place. Wray understands but his concern is that these term limitations may serve to push people off of committees that have served and wish to continue serving as committee volunteers. Strickland feels that newcomers to Summerfield and new volunteers should be given an opportunity to serve on committees as well. Speaking from the floor, new

resident Jeff Johnson noted that Summerfield is not a very inviting town in terms of citizen involvement and the current way of doing things makes it very hard for newcomers to join committees.

Following a brief discussion, it was decided by consensus to revisit this issue in a year.

C. Review/Appoint applicants to Comprehensive Plan Steering Committee (Council)

Strickland asked if there were not already 20 voting members on this committee. Flowers stated 5 ex-officio members were recently appointed, bringing the total to 7, when the committee voted to have 3 to 5 ex-officio members. She has no problem with the applicants, but there are rules and procedures in place that need to be followed. Brandt stated there are currently 19 voting members on the committee, and there was a recommendation to find volunteers from the underrepresented northeast quadrant of town, as both of these applicants are. Strickland noted that Dwayne Crawford is from an underrepresented area as well and council chose not to move him up into the vacant voting member slot. Williams recommended making both applicants ex-officio members and Flowers stated the committee did not want more than 5. Williams feels that a few more members to observe will not hurt.

It was decided by consensus to ask the committee to make a recommendation as to what member should be moved from ex-officio to voting status, and to direct Brandt to not bring any more Comprehensive Plan Steering Committee applications forward for consideration.

Wray made a motion to appoint Al Colanero and David P Layton as ex-officio members of the Comprehensive Plan Steering Committee. The motion was seconded by Williams and carried unanimously.

OTHER BUSINESS (if any)

Strickland asked that the official record reflect the 600 signers of petition documents presented by Dwayne Crawford. The certified list of petition signers is attached to these minutes as Appendix A. She noted that 35 emails to Wray was enough to revisit the volunteer application issue, and the 600 citizens opposed to the amphitheater should be enough to warrant revisiting that issue. Strickland feels she has an obligation to the citizens to request that. Flowers feels that Mike Stewart's suggestion that the petition signers did not know what they were signing was insulting.

Strickland asked that the issue be put on the August agenda. Brandt stated there were two options: to ask the mayor to put it on the agenda, or to make a motion to amend the agenda at the beginning of the meeting.

COMMENTS FROM THE COUNCIL - None

Brown read the reasons for entering into Closed Session as follows:



Barnes made a motion to enter into closed session at 10:20 pm. The motion was seconded by Wray and carried unanimously.


Barnes made a motion to return to open session at 10:30 pm. The motion was seconded by Wray and carried unanimously.

2008 Summerfield Municipal Amphitheater Petition #2

Quote: "...because we were elected to make these decisions." - Councilman Bob Williams

Very few citizens have asked for it, yet construction of a municipal amphitheater has always been a "done deal" in the minds of some council members since 2002.

In 2002, we, the citizens of Summerfield, were surveyed and asked what services we wanted if it meant a property tax. The response was an overwhelming "we want nothing if it means a property tax". When challenged on this issue as it related to planned park expenditures, (then) Mayor Barnes stated "*The survey was sent to GIVE information to the citizens - it was never meant to be a referendum - whatever information was obtained from the survey, you can read any way you want.*" (SFTC - 07/06/2004)

Council did put the 2002 survey responses to good use. Surveys were sorted, culled, and used to solicit people for interest in volunteering on committees that support council projects (2004 verbal accounting by Dianne Laughlin, Town Clerk, to Dwayne Crawford). Citizens survey responses opposing council spending ambitions (most of them) were not useful and have been ignored by council.

We were again surveyed in late 2005, this time for our particular interest in park amenities. Bathrooms, walking trails, and open, passive recreation fields (think frisbee & kite flying fields) topped the list (in that order). When survey results were translated into our Phase 2 PARTF grant application, the municipal amphitheater project was somehow front and center of community interest - well, thats what council told the state grant people. What may also surprise you is that the \$46,000 consultant that helped write the matching grant application agreed that the included statement "heavy park usage since opening in Sept 2006, and additional facilities needed to accommodate citizen demands for recreation opportunities" in our phase 2 grant application was hypothetical - in other words, historical park usage in grant application had **no basis in fact** - this is because the town never measured park usage (SFTC - Jan 9, 2007).

Sitting on your hands and doing nothing is no longer an option - this behavior encourages, empowers, and enables those with designs on how your money will be used to better "the community" in ways that cater to their own particular interests.

Sign and return the accompanying petition ASAP.

Encourage your family, friends and neighbors to do the same. Our taxes are already being used to construct a county amphitheater at Triad Park (Colfax). Your county tax dollars also go to support Bur-Mill park, just outside of town limits, which is loaded with amenities.

No one is against having a clean, low cost, low maintenance passive park with walking trails and picnic shelters - but constructing an "amusement plaything" for the few entitlement-minded social elite in Summerfield is OVER THE TOP in terms of what is reasonable or in the general "public" interest.

To get the attention of council on this issue, we need 1065 signatures of registered voters. This will exceed maximum number of votes cast for any council member in the 2007 election. With 8000+ registered voters in Summerfield, this is an easily achievable number.
